2023 Hub Day Visit - Wednesday 7th December

Invites have been handed out and we are all looking forward to spending the day with our 2023 students in our 2023 hubs. Teachers will be getting to know the students in the morning and all parents and/or caregivers are welcome to come into the hubs from 1.10pm.

Service Awards Assembly and End-of-Year Prizegiving:

As with other years we have two special events at the end of the year. The first is the Service Awards Assembly where we acknowledge students for leadership roles and efforts throughout the year. This is taking place on Monday 12th December at 11am. It also acts as a bit of practice for our Prizegiving and is less formal. Whaanau are welcome to attend. Our End-of-Year School Prizegiving is set for Tuesday 13th December at 6pm. This will be in a similar format as last year's with the event being a Drive-In Prizegiving. Families in cars will be parked at the back of the field and those who wish to be closer to the staging are welcome to bring a picnic blanket for their whaanau to sit on up the front.

2023 Bus

Bus tickets will remain the same price for Term 1, 2023. Due to the rising costs everywhere, the School Board are looking at sustainable options for the future. As you will be aware the Ministry of Education are concerned about the number of out-of-zone students attending our school, considering that Horotiu has a large number of housing developments within zone.

Horotiu School Uniform Items

Although we don't wear an official full uniform that students wear on a daily basis, we do still have compulsory clothing every student must have. These are to be worn for school events such as Pöwhiri, school trips and special events.

Students are expected to purchase these as soon as possible if they do not have them already. We have a powhiri in Week one of Term 1 and a whole-school trip in February where all students will be expected to be wearing these. Compulsory:

- Every child must have the School Polo Shirt (\$45)
- Every child must have either the School Fleece (\$25) and/or the School Jacket (\$65)
- Every child must have a wide-brimmed hat or a cap with a flap on the back for Terms 1 and 4.
 The School Hat is available for \$18.50 should you wish for your child to wear this one.



A Reminder to all our Whaanau of our Policy below:

Community Conduct Expectations

Horotiu School is committed to providing a safe and healthy environment for students, staff, and visitors.

Our Code of Conduct serves as a reminder to all parents, caregivers, and school visitors that their conduct must support everyone's emotional and physical wellbeing, and not harm it in any way.

The Code of Conduct applies:

- to all conduct, speech, and action, and includes emails, texts, phone calls, social media, or other communication
- while on school grounds or at another venue where students and/or staff are assembled for school purposes (such as a camp or sports match).

Standards of conduct

Horotiu School expects parents, caregivers, and visitors to:

- treat everyone with respect
- work together in partnership with staff for the benefit of students
- respect and adhere to our school values
- set a good example for students at all times
- follow school procedures to handle any complaints
- adhere to school policies and procedures (such as those listed below), and any legal requirements.

Examples of unsuitable conduct include:

- threats, bullying, harassment
- profanity/offensive language
- insulting, abusing, or intimidating behaviour
- racism or discrimination (e.g. based on ethnicity, religion)
- physical aggression
- deception/fraud
- damaging school property
- smoking, vaping, possessing, or using alcohol/drugs/other harmful substances on school premises or at another venue where students and/or staff are assembled for school purposes (except possession or use of alcohol in accordance with school policy)
- placing unreasonable and excessive expectations on staff time or resources
- pursuing a complaint or campaign, or making defamatory, offensive, or derogatory comments, regarding the school, its board, or any staff or students on social media or other public forums
- wearing gang insignia on the school grounds. (This is not allowed under the Prohibition of Gang Insignia legislation, and anyone wearing it will be asked to leave.)

Dealing with breaches of the Code of Conduct

How Horotiu School deals with breaches of our Code of Conduct depends on the nature of the incident and its seriousness, and the process any witness or victim of the behaviour feels most comfortable with.

Around the Hubs: Harakeke (Year 3/4)

The Harakeke Hub have been enjoying the pool on these hot afternoons and this week have been exploring ways to demonstrate our water confidence and personal buoyancy. Together we have come up with some actions for a game called Ship Wreck' which is a water version of Captain's Coming. We had to use our imagination to think about what we might see if we were shipwrecked. Here is an example of some of the actions the class came up with.

Coconut - bring knees to chest and bob around the pool like a coconut. Starfish - float on back like a starfish.

Submarine - arm extended like a periscope, body submerged.

Lightning Bolt - mess up wet hair like you've been struck by lightning.

A couple of favourites have been Alligators and Crocodiles, Pool Volleyball, Captain's Coming and making waves in the pool and trying to float towards the end on our backs and wading the water.

All of Kawakawa students are getting prepared to make their food creations on Tuesday. We are looking forward to seeing what everyone comes up with and have some tasty treats.

Around the Hubs: Pohutukawa (Year 6/7):

Pohutukawa have been extremely busy trying to pack lots of learning into the last few weeks of the year. We have been inquiring about the makeup of different kai and The effects it can have on our tinana (body) and our hinengaro (mind). We have started swimming as well, which most of the students have loved. We have been focusing on different poetry styles, as well as metaphor and simile in our writing. Our progress and passion for te reo Maaori and waiata has grown. Reading has focused on predictions and presentations, which resulted in some amazing future shortland street stars emerging. Around the Hubs: Maanuka (Year 7/8):



In Maanuka we have been focusing on food and nutrition. Students are beginning to understand that all food is good as everything serves a different purpose. Although some kai is more nutritious and beneficial for our body, other kai brings joy and happiness and helps us to experience different cultures and create memories. Our students have also been learning about the different macro-nutrients contained in food and have created their own meal plan. We have started using Hine's Puku Scale in our classroom to help us better understand our bodies and whether or not we are eating enough in order for our bodies to function to the best of its ability.







We have also been practising water safety just in time for summer.





