The boys doubled their points on the '*Fruits*' round while the girls opted for '*Classics*'. Some questions included: Name three fruits the Hungry Caterpillar ate, and What was the name of the man who taught Oliver Twist to steal? 1st place went to Berkley Normal Middle School and 2nd place to Marian School, who will both attend the Wellington National Final on 17 June.

Pink Shirt Day: This Friday 19th May

Pink Shirt Day is about working together to stop bullying by celebrating diversity and promoting kindness and inclusiveness. It's about creating a community where all people feel safe, valued and respected, regardless of difference.

This Friday we encourage whaanau, staff and students to wear pink (doesn't have to be a shirt if you don't have one) and help get the message out there. We are not collecting donations here at school but should you wish to donate, you can do so through the <u>Pink Shirt Day</u> link.

The money raised on Pink Shirt Day is used by the Mental Health Foundation on a number of initiatives designed to eliminate bullying including the creation of a new wellbeing programme for teenagers to be rolled out for free across all secondary schools in Aotearoa.

Funds raised also support the free resources around bullying prevention which we share with thousands of schools, workplaces and communities throughout the year, especially on Pink Shirt Day.

Meet Vika

Watch and discover the very special reason why 9-year-old Vika is taking part in Pink Shirt Day, and how you can stand with her. Vika is proud of her older brother Joseph and her younger sister Lalelei who are both autistic. She hopes, that if her brother or sister are ever bullied, there will be an Upstander around to look out for them.

Getting To and From School Safely: A Team Effort

There have been a few close calls and incidents brought to our attention this term both in our carpark and out along the road. We obviously don't want to see anybody hurt or involved in vehicle and/or pedestrian collisions so please as drivers consider the safety of others at all times.

- In the carpark 'Kiss and Drop Zone' (8.30-9am), please follow the u-turn and drop-off process - Be patient and do not 'leap frog' cars in front or park in the marked spaces during this time. It is important that every car drive as far around as possible (ie back to the gate facing out) to fit as many vehicles in at all times. There is a marked pedestrian space along the fenceline for all children to use to get to the gate.
- U-turns into Kernott Road are not illegal but there have been a number of close calls with children and other vehicles recently when drivers have done this. We suggest using the roundabout over the bridge on River Rd to turn around or to change routes and use Washer Rd as an option to bring you out onto the school side of the road.
- Children travelling by bikes to and from school are expected to wear cycle helmets. Safety is of the utmost importance - please ensure your child consistently does so.
- Please only park in the allocated spaces on our roadside. Road marked areas (ie yellow dotted lines) are there for a reason (ie bus parking, to ensure our Traffic Safety team have visibility to cross kids safely, as well as legal parking rules).
- All pedestrians who need to cross the road are asked to cross at our Road Crossing area at the front of the office gates. This is deemed by the Police as the safest place to cross as both pedestrians and drivers have maximum visibility. Our Road Safety team help children and whaanau get across the road safely in the afternoons. We ask all who are crossing the roads to use this as our only crossing point.






'Striving Together for Success' Newsletter:

Around the Hubs

Tiitoki (Reception-Y0):

Tiitoki have been busy learning a lot of Te Reo Maaori including how to count to 13. We have also been doing a lot of science, seeing how cabbage water changes when you add an acid and base, shaking polymers out of the fluff from nappies and seeing how this holds water, exploring sound vibrations with paper cups and making volcanoes from vinegar, baking soda, food colouring and dishwashing liquid.



We have had a very busy start to our term! The tamariki have been very interested and engaged in all the activities and experiments we have done. So far, they have learned that things are either a solid, liquid or gas.

Last week they were paleontologists, having a try at excavating dinosaurs and learning about fossils.

We are currently having a go at being botanists, and have a kumara in our class that we will watch grow over the term to see how plants grow.

Pohutukawa has also been learning sign language in our room, which has been fun for the students to learn and integrate into our day.

Koromiko (Year 2/3)

In Koromiko we have been looking at Physical World, Material World and Living World as some of the different parts of the Science Curriculum. Miss Sterling has been looking at temperature with her tamariki and were lucky enough to have made some jelly.



While Mrs Parker and Whaea Kiri have been in, they have been looking at the habitats in our Living World. See below for some of the tamariki's work.

On Fridays as part of our programme, Mrs Inglis takes a group for art. Over the last couple of weeks we have been looking at Autumn leaves, warm colours, and using pastels as our medium to work with.









How to Make a Tissue Float

Materials Needed

- Tissue
- Tape
- Ballon
- Felt tip
- ScissorsInstructions

1.First you get a piece of tissue and draw a dotted house with a felt tip.

2. Cut out the dotted house carefully with scissors.

- 3. Tape the house on your table with tape.
- 4. Get a balloon, blow it up and tie it.

5. Rub the balloon fast on your head then slowly lower the balloon on top of the tissue (but don't actually put it on the tissue). Then the tissue will float.

Kawakawa (Year 5/6):

Kawakawa have been enjoying starting our days with a bit of exercise by learning and playing soccer or volleyball this term. We have found our tamariki have been really focused when they come back in for Mathematics and ready to hit the day!

Thank you to all the parents who came to see us for Parent-Teacher interviews. It was so great to talk and learn more about your tamariki. A few common threads of conversation were about homework and how you can support your tamariki at home. At Horotiu we don't have a requirement for homework but we understand that you may want to sit down and do some learning with your children. Students each have a *Steps Web* account, a *Mathletics* account, a *Read Theory* account and an *Xtramath* account. They all know their passwords but if you would like a copy of them feel free to write us a dojo message or email us. Don't ever think that reading a book with your child isn't enough, or doing daily chores or tasks with your children isn't as important. Being at home and enjoying time with your family always supersedes homework, but we are here to support you if you want some ideas.

Maanuka (Year 7/8):



Our tamariki have settled into Term 2 really well. The Inquiry focus for the term is Science. We are looking into the Nature of Science through the Physical World and the Material World strands of the curriculum. Maanuka and Kawakawa are doing Inquiry together.

Students got to choose out of four options and were placed into groups. The options were: floating and sinking, investigating combustion in candles, kitchen chemistry and preserved food. So far working across hubs has been successful and students have enjoyed the learning.

School Sores:

We have had a few cases of school sores (impetigo) being reported lately throughout the school. These are common in children and are easily spread. If your child(ren) has a sore that is not healing as you would expect, please keep a close eye on it and get medical treatment as/when needed. Children should be kept at home until the the sores have dried up or at least 24 hours after antibiotics have started. Keep sores covered. Thank you for your help in addressing this issue for our children.

Please be aware that Horotiu School do not endorse or affiliate with any social media pages outside of the Horotiu School Gala Facebook page. Class Dojo is our primary platform for online communication with our school whaanau.

Home Learning with Mrs Foster (Learning Support Coordinator):

I'd like to take a moment to emphasise that learning is not limited to the classroom. While we provide learning during school hours, learning can happen anywhere, at any time.

As a child grows and develops, they encounter numerous opportunities for learning outside of school. From playing games to visiting new places, every experience can teach valuable lessons. Encourage your child to explore their interests and pursue activities that engage their minds.

Here are two simple and fun activities you can try at home to help strengthen short-term memory, which is essential for retaining and processing new information.

Activity 1: Supermarket Superbrain!

- 1. Before leaving your house, ask your child to use their fingers to remember several grocery items, i.e. milk, bread and toothpaste.
- 2. Ask them to repeat the list using one finger to represent each item, i.e. 3 items, 3 fingers.
- 3. When you arrive at the supermarket, ask your child to recall the grocery items using their fingers as prompts.
- 4. Increase the number of grocery items each time you visit the supermarket.

Activity 2: What's Missing?

- 1. Place five or more household objects in front of your child.
- 2. Ask them to close their eyes.
- 3. Remove one of the items.
- 4. Ask your child to open their eyes and see if they can identify which item is missing.
- You could also use letters, words or numbers.
