Paid stop work meeting for NZEI Teachers - Paid Union Meeting

This meeting was to brief teachers on the changes happening/coming to the education sector with the change of Govt and to get teacher voice on the key points they want NZEI to lobby for on their behalf.

Some of the key things happening within the education sector currently...

- The move towards twice-a-year national testing in reading, writing and maths. How this data will be used and shared has yet to be announced. Observations from other countries warn us that performing in tests becomes the focus of the education system with National Testing.
- Significant cuts to funding support for children with learning needs.
- Attendance the MOE directive to target attendance has been left to teachers and other school staff to improve without additional support.
- The "social-work" aspect of working with families has moved from external agencies to now sit largely with schools.
- Agencies who work with schools face significant cutbacks.
- Property maintenance has been significantly cut back.

This meeting aims to make the education sector aware of the impact of these changes across the board and develop key lobbying points to take forward.

School Attendance:

Term 1 is a timely reminder to everyone about how important it is to maintain regular attendance for our children so they are able to be successful at school and make steady progress.

Lateness also has a significant impact for students, it's often a barrier for children who miss the calm and welcoming routine of the morning, miss notices and instructions that set them up for the day. Being on time early: 8.30-9am is the perfect time for your child to arrive and unpack their belongings, check in with their teacher(s), meet up with their friends and relax into their day. Class starts at 9am.



Our school has an attendance support team whose role it is to analyse our data and provide us with guidelines around attendance issues (through the Ministry of Education) and we also have Ramon (pictured), our School Attendance Officer that works alongside our school and whaanau to support students in getting to school regularly. At Horotiu School we aim for our students to be here at least 90% of the time. When it drops below this, we seek to make contact with families and explore how we can support them and their child(ren) in getting here.

We ask that all parents do their best to set their child(ren) up for success by getting them to school on-time and regularly. If they are unwell or there is another reason for absence, please communicate this to the office or teaching team. Please note that the online system notes any unexplained absence as 'Truant'.

Horotiu School ANZAC Service

'We will remember them.' Please join us, under our flag, at 11am on Friday the 12th April for our school ANZAC Service. ANZAC Poppies will be available from the office (once they are released) for a gold coin donation. If you are attending the Ngaruawahia ANZAC service in the holidays please wear your school shirt, we will select some children who are at the cenotaph to present our school wreaths on our behalf.

Kia ora e te whaanau

We've been very busy over the past month. Our term has been packed with a lot of learning and other events such as Tech and Assessment Week, Waka Kopapa and Swimming Sports. Tamariki have adapted well to the busy weeks that we've had so far.

As most of you should know we decided last year, to do our 'Tech' programme in school rather than at Ngaruawahia Primary School and our first rotation of Tech seemed to be a hit with our tamariki. We ran this over two weeks. Two groups did Food Tech and Woodwork with Whaea Antonia and Mr Wright while the other two groups stayed in the class with Whaea Alex. The following week the other two groups did Paper-Making and Tukutuku Panels with Whaea Alex and Ms Purdy.

In Food Tech we utilised the fruit on our trees and made pear loaf and apple muffins, as well as calzone and focaccia bread. In Wood Work they made wooden spoons, a wooden cell phone speaker and banana holders. In Paper Making they used their own DIY paper to make diaries and they also made their own charcoal to make pencils out of harakeke stems. In Tukutuku they went on a field trip to the University of Waikato and the Hamilton Museum to see traditional and contemporary tukutuku before designing and weaving their own tukutuku panels. Ka mau te wehi! We're looking forward to doing it all again next term when students will change to their next

rotation.









EOTC Water Safety Trip to Lake Puketirini

Home and School Support:


Home Learning with Mrs Foster (Learning Support Coordinator - LSC)

This month, I've decided to focus on executive functions. Let's take a deeper dive into what they are, and how you can support your child in developing these critical life skills.

What are executive functions?

Executive functions are thinking skills that enable people to:

- plan, organise and prioritise
- focus attention
- remember instructions
- solve problems



We all use executive functions every day. As a parent, you use your executive functions not just for yourself, but for the the whole whaanau. For example, getting kids to school and/or sports practises on time, planning meals, purchasing kai, completing chores... the list goes on. All these things require planning, time management and organisational ability which are key executive functions.

Children with executive function difficulties often feel misunderstood which can lead to frustration and comments like: "This is too hard." or "School is boring." The great news is that executive functions can be modelled and explicitly taught.

Practical ideas to help strengthen executive functions at home:

- Ensure you have routines and structure.
- Model good listening skills: stop, look and maintain eye contact with the person who is speaking.
- Model how to stop and think before you act.
- Use self-talk: e.g. "have I got everything?", "I can do this!"
- Have a place for everything and keep everything in its place.
- Teach your child how to organise their bedroom so they know where everything goes.
- With your child, work out a system to store similar clothes and items together.
- Model good time management be on time.
- Have a calendar on the wall and write important events on it. Look at it with your child so they know what
 is coming up.
- Provide your child with visual checklists for getting ready or preparing for bedtime.
- Be consistent and clear about rules and consequences.
- Model behaviours you want to see (not what you don't want to see).
- Remove devices and screens, including TVs from your child's bedroom.
- Develop independence don't do everything for them.
- Praise effort, hard work, persistence and perseverance.
- Model learning from mistakes and having a growth mindset.
- Set aside a minimum of 15 minutes a few times a week to do fun things together.
- Investigate your own strengths and weaknesses in terms of your executive functions. If you're weak in an area, ask someone for help.
