As we do each year, we will be sending home seed potatoes with all students who are encouraged to plant and nurture them (we can see how many we grew on Ag Day in Term 3), planting along the Waikato River (just down the cycleway) and engaging with activities and events that celebrate all that Matariki brings.

Our very special Hautapu Ceremony will be at 6.30-7.30am on Wednesday 18th June.

The Hautapu Ceremony is optional and students either need to return home afterwards until 8.30am or be booked into Before School Care with Kelly Club. Dress warm for the cold morning. A hangi will also be laid on this day and be available with a sausage sizzle at 12.30pm. All are welcome to attend.

A reminder that there is no school on Thursday 19th June as we hold our Teacher Only Day, nor on Friday 20th June as we as a nation, mark the importance of Matariki as a special and public holiday.



News and Celebrations: Maths Curriculum Implementation at Horotiu

Over the past year, there has been a great deal of public attention on how mathematics is taught in New Zealand classrooms. However, here at our school, we've been working for much longer to foster a more positive attitude towards maths among our pupils.

Thanks to additional government funding, we were able to invest in the *Maths* — *No Problem!* resource, which has become a valuable tool for our teachers. This resource helps guide the scope and sequence of our maths curriculum, supports lesson planning, and suggests targeted materials to reinforce key concepts. It also supports students through the use of 'think alouds' and engaging, structured workbooks. We realise the true power of talking through how to attack or break down different problems, where the students are working together to solve these.

So far this year, pupils across the school have explored Place Value, Addition and Subtraction, and are now improving their understanding of Multiplication and Division. In Year 1, they have been working on an in depth knowledge of early maths concepts, laying a solid foundation. It's been especially rewarding to see not only improved results, but also an increase in student enthusiasm and their ability to articulate their thought processes using maths vocabulary.

At recent parent-teacher interviews, many caregivers shared how much their children are enjoying maths — a fantastic reflection of the positive impact of our work. It's exciting to see, watch this space!



Home and School Learning Support: Mrs Foster - Learning Support Coordinator (LSC) & Better Start Literacy Approach Facilitator

In our busy lives, it's easy to get caught up in the digital world. Let's remember the power of connection and conversation, especially with our tamariki. This week, I encourage you to take a little extra time to put down the devices and chat with your children about their school day or other events in their life.

Instead of asking: "How was school?", try sparking discussions with open-ended questions like:

- "What was the most interesting thing you learned today, and why did it stand out to you?"
- "Can you tell me about a time you helped someone or someone helped you today?"
- "If you could change one thing about your day, what would it be and why?"
- "What made you laugh or smile today?"
- "What questions are you still thinking about from your lessons?"

Taking just a few minutes to truly listen and engage with tamariki and their experiences can make a world of difference. It can foster stronger relationships and show them that their thoughts and feelings matter. Let's power down to power up our conversations!

Pohutukawa

Pohutukawa have been doing a lot of education outside the classroom while the weather is still good. We went for a bike ride with Matua Gig along our beautiful awa to Mangaharakeke and learnt about the Pou and the kumara pit down there and also practised our biking skills. This week we joined Kawakawa and Matua Gig to make fires and cook marshmallows. The tamariki enjoyed gathering tinder and kindling to make the fires and did some good writing afterwards.



Koromiko

Koromiko tamariki have enjoyed some cool opportunities away from school this term! A small number went out to the Velodrome in Cambridge to test out some new bikes, and had a great time speeding around! We have been doing biking for Physical Education every Friday, and it has been cool to see the children gaining confidence on bikes.

More of our tamariki took part in a football tournament held at Bremworth Park, playing many different schools. Our 2 teams had a mix of wins and losses, but showed lots of resilience, perseverance, and great sportsmanship. There were lots of smiles and support from tamariki and whaanau on the day, we are very proud of them!





Harakeke (Year 3-4)

Harakeke have had a super busy start to the term. Some of our highlights have been learning the importance of being specific when doing procedural writing, how natural disasters occurs and how to prepare for them and the different parts of a wharenui.
