




Koromiko

Academically, our attention remains firmly on the Core Curriculum subjects: Reading, Writing, and Maths. Year 4 students have been concentrating on the interpretation of graphs, enhancing their data analysis skills. Year 5 students have been exploring geometric principles, beginning with right, obtuse, and acute angles, followed by parallelograms, and are now progressing into the foundational concepts of symmetry. The Kawakawa teachers are now shifting our focus to planning an amazing camp for our tamariki at the end of this term. How exciting!

Horotiu School History: The Swimming Pool

With everyone eagerly awaiting the arrival of summer and the opening of the school pool, you may be interested to read about early swimming at Horotiu School and how and why the school pool came to fruition.

This excerpt comes from the 1962 Reunion and Farewell to Mr Dan McPherson (Principal) Souvenir Brochure. You may recognise the old school building in the background which has since been relocated to Nga Miro in Ngaruawahia.

THE SWIMMING POOL


For many years swimming parades were held at the Waikato Riverbank, where a learners' pool had been netted off, and diving platform and springboard provided for the stronger swimmers. A very watchful eye had to be kept, however, and parents and staff welcomed the advent of a handier and safer pool in the school grounds.

A great deal of the initial work was done by working bees, and considerable help was given by the Waipa County Council in the matter of drainage. The response from the residents to a canvass for funds was remarkable for such a small district, for over £600 was subscribed in a couple of days. Mr. Keith Hay giving £50.

Mr. George Sullivan, the then Secretary of the School Committee and an old pupil, incorporated several original facilities, which were copied by a number of other schools. A modern filter and our own bore-water, ensure hygenic conditions at all times.

Visitors are intrigued at the paintings on the walls and the bottom of the baths, but these are there to aid the "tinies" to gain confidence in the water by putting their heads under to count the fish etc.

The pool was officially opened in 1958 by Mr. J. McWhannell. Chairman of the South Auckland Education Board.
